PRESIDENTIAL OBSERVATION

For a small NGO like ours to sustain itself for long twenty four years playing a humble role in a limited sphere in the social sector speaks volumes in silence about its role and relevance. An introspection of our multifarious activities over the long years left behind, be it in respect of caring for distressed women & their children or of disadvantaged girls or in relation to conducting need based workshops, Seminars, Field surveys or research based studies, we have reasons to feel not only canted and satisfied but also quite proud of our achievements. The greatest driving force that has propelled us to move forward has been the unstrained and spontaneous support and assistance we have received perennially from our well wishers and more specifically from the dedicated and committed members of our Governing Body. Our seed capital, the basic source of strength, has all along been our credibility as a trustworthy organisation. More than two decades of involvement in the social sector has given us enough exposures to many hard realities more specifically to some of the biggest speed breakers that not only dampen the interest and enthusiasm of NGOs but also compel them to compromise with the demands of time against their conscience just for the interest of their organisation. Such woes and agonies specifically of well meaning NGOs, who are the worst victims, would continue as long as a complete overhauling and revamping of the system and structures dealing with NGO related affairs at all levels have not been taken up to ensure at least three important things to happen.

(b) The on-going schemes should be handled on a different footing, exempting them from submitting volumes of identificial documents every year. They should only be required to submit the current list of beneficiaries, staff list and budget along with the inspection report. The grants may be released as quickly as possible for smooth running of the projects.

The suggestions above, if considered with sympathy and seriousness would give a new sense of purpose and direction to all NGOs across the nation to enable them to emerge as catalysts for carrying forward welfare programmes of Govt. to the targeted clientele.

Probably in the context of writing a preface for the Annual Report, all my observations above may appear little unconventional and also emotional. But I could not resist the dictates of my inner voice to open up my mind and share my feelings with our fellow travellers. Hence I thought if it is not now, it can't be in future.

Before I close, I shall once again express my sincerest thanks and gratitude to each one individually who has in one way or the other helped us in our endeavours. The year under reporting was a remarkable year for Vijaya and I feel privileged to highlight a few of our activities and achievements-

Conducted a series of training programs for Ashas and ANMS under the NHM programme of Government of India with our office at Bhubaneswar and Swadhar Greh at Puri selected as DTS and trained more than 1000 Ashas at Bhubaneswar and 1200 at Puri.

The Annual function of the school was organised in a grand scale.

The inmates of special school had the privilege of participating in different cultural programs at the district level, also the State level.

Nine students of the school had appeared in the Annual HSC Examination, 2019 and in which 8 students in 2nd division and 1 student in 3rd division.

A well equipped computer training Centre with specially designed soft ware for training disabled girls was set up with financial support from Mr. SAM SCHUPPE of USA.

Representatives from Vijaya attended a number of National Conference, Regional Conference, state level work shops, Seminars and interactive forum during this year.

VIJAYA

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Organisational Profile: VIJAYA is an organisation registered under the Societies Registration Act 1860 on 14th October bearing Registration No –“20154/1996-97-118.with its Regd. office located at 507, Sahidnagar, Bhubaneswar, Dist. Khurda. The organisation has also been registered under Foreign Contribution (Regulation) Act 1976 on 14th July 2000 and also under IT Act for exemptions under section 80G. Vijaya has the following Visions, Missions and Goals.

Vision

Vijaya aspires a just society, where people irrespective of caste and creed, rich and poor, powerful and powerless, male and female live at par with each other following the values of sustainable development, global common-hood and empathy towards each others.

Mission

Initiate people oriented development process in which the men and women belonging to different groups (Backward, Tribal & Coastal) shall come together to change the powerlessness situation and enhance their socio-economic standard and carry on the process even after the NGO withdraws.

Our Goal

1. Building capacity of the communities ensuring gender equity.
2. Institutional development of partner Organisations through learning from each other's strength.
3. Providing consultancy services/ support to the grass root level Organisations.
4. Policy advocacy, reforms and networking.
5. Providing rehabilitation service/education to the less fortunate and disabled.
6. Providing shelter, skill development training and education to the helpless widows and women in difficult situations.

Our Team

1. “Vijaya” is managed by its Executive Body headed by the President. The Executive Body meets quarterly on regular basis to review alignment of its policies and course of action. The body reviews the activities of the organisation and monitors its roadmap on a regular basis.

2. Among the other office bearers the General Secretary and Treasurer Play important role in overseeing the day today activities of the organisation and keep a close watch of the project management and financial progress. Other office bearers, Project Manager and staff carry out the assigned responsibilities efficiently.
3. A number of professionals like Health consultants, Management consultants, Developmental consultants, Sociologists, Educationists and Psychologists, are associated with us for helping and guiding in different project preparation and their execution.

Our Functional Location

VIJAYA has the following projects at different locations through which its various activities are being carried on as briefed below:-

A .THE NODAL OFFICE AT BHUBANESWAR: - It functions as the head quarter and nodal office of VIJAYA. Part of this building also serves the purpose of Training Center for different training programmes. The office is well furnished and equipped. It is managed by a qualified and experienced team of staff comprising of

B.SWADHAR GREH AT PURI

SWADHAR Greh is a Government of India sponsored Women Welfare Scheme supported by the Ministry of Women and Child Development. It is a rehabilitation centre for women who are victims of domestic violence, family atrocities, trafficking, rape, negligence, and run away girls. The scheme, in essence, commits to provide shelter, food, clothing, health care for the distressed girls and women. It also works towards ensuring opportunities for learning different skills to live life with dignity.

Under this scheme over 30 destitute women have been provided short term shelter. This programme is operational since April 2006. However, the number of inmates keeps fluctuating. Sometimes it goes up beyond the scheduled limit of 30.

Management Team- A team of professionals, assistants are deployed to take care of the inmates and run the Greh on a day to day basis. The team comprises of:

1. Residential Superintendent
2. Counsellor
3. Office Assistant cum DEO
4. Doctor (Part Time)
5. Guard/Watchman-2

Activities in SWADHAR Greh

Rehabilitation

SWADHAR Greh is the place where women in distressed conditions are rescued and given shelter. Constant efforts are being made to rehabilitate women in need on regular basis. Some women reach the Swadhar Greh knowing its existence, few are rescued by the staff and volunteers associated with Swadhar Greh and the district administration/ police also send women in need of help to the Swadhar Greh. These inmates' basic needs are met and they are provided with skill development training so that they can engage themselves in economic activities even after they are discharged from the shelter home..

Counseling

After getting admitted in the shelter, the women are thoroughly counseled by professional counselor appointed in the Greh. Their mental condition is assessed and accordingly support is provided to them. If they are undergoing any kind of trauma, fear or anxiety, necessary support is arranged for them. Thereafter, regular counseling sessions are conducted by professionals and in exceptional cases medical attention is sought for their wellbeing.

Health Care

Health care remains one of the major thrust in the shelter. The women who reach the Swadhar Greh may already be suffering from critical mental or physical health problems. These health issues are addressed with immediate effect. Regular health check ups are done in the shelter by qualified doctor. For each of the inmates separate health record is maintained to monitor the status of their health and chronic diseases if any. They are provided with free medicines and in emergency cases medical facility is obtained from the nearest local government hospital. Besides this, regular physical activities like yoga, meditation, devotional prayer are conducted here. Care is taken to maintain, personal hygiene, sanitation of the inmates.

Recreation

Women who have undergone stressful life situation need to divert their minds from the past events and get engaged in constructive activities. Therefore, the inmates are encouraged to sing devotional songs in the evening and morning, watching TV especially the programmes on religious practice, yoga etc. They are also allowed to go whenever they wish to meet their near and dear ones and they are taken on trips to visit temples at Bhubaneswar and other religious places.

The committee regularly meets once in every three months.

B. Vijaya Binapani Hellen Keler Special School for visually and hearing impaired children, Langudi, Bhadrakh.

In Langudi village of Bhadrakh district, the Vijaya Binapani Helen Keller Special School is run under the scheme on of Deen Dayal Rehabilitation Scheme of Ministry of Social Justice and Empowerment, Government of India since 2005. Currently there are 32 number of visually impaired children and 60 hearing impaired children studying between class 1 to class 10. The detail is given below:

In the academic year 2019-2020 09 no students had appeared 10th board exam and all of them have passed in the exam.

As per the recommendation of the District Collector, the Hon'ble High Court by an interim order, OJC No.16968 of 2001 had initially entrusted the management of the School to VIJAYA under the supervision of the Collector and with the closure of the case, VIJAYA has undertaken the full responsibility of management of the school.

The school which started functioning at Balarampur in 1995 was first shifted to Bonth Chhak on 15.08.2005 and then to a location at Erein, Charampa on 27.06.2006 and finally to a newly constructed building provided by Guljarimal Durga Dutta Memorial Trust on rental basis.

Construction and development of School building

The School was running in a rented building from the year 2005 to 2018. With support from patron member and philanthropist Mr Jugal Kishore Agarwal and the resources of the organization (VIJAYA) a new building was constructed for the school. The school building was ready by November 2018 and the children shifted here. A play ground has been constructed within the school boundary with play equipments. This is a child friendly and disability friendly playground.

Plantation

Different fruit bearing plants have been planted and seasonal vegetables are also grown in the boundary of the school premise. This meets the vegetables requirement of the residential students.



Staff position

There is a dedicated team of staff to manage the day to day activities of the school. The overall performance is monitored by the project team of VIJAYA. The staff team in the school is as follows:

C. ASHA Training Programme

The Government of Odisha has assigned VIJAYA with the task of conducting training programme for ASHAs in Khordha and Puri districts. Looking at the past years' experience of the organization in building capacity of ASHAs, availability of infrastructural and logistic facilities different phases of ASHA trainings are conducted by VIJAYA. In the year 2019-20 the following training programmes for ASHAs were conducted in the premises of VIJAYA both at Bhubaneswar and Puri.

1. Refresher training of ASHAs, Khorda district: 22.10.2019 to 12.12.2019 (Khorda, Tangi, Bhubaneswar, Bolgarh Blocks)
2. Induction training for newly appointed ASHAs: 22.01.2020 to 29.01.2020
3. Round One: Home Based Newborn Care Training Programme for Newly Selected ASHAs 31.01.2020 to 4.02.2020
4. Training on Non communicable diseases for newly selected ASHAs: 12.03.2020 to 16.03.2020
5. Induction Training for newly selected ASHAs in Puri district: 14.11.2019 to 21.11.2019 and 27.11.2019 to 4.12.2019
6. Refresher Training for ASHAs, Puri district: 22.11.2019 to 29.01.2020 (Alugum, Astaranga, Kakatapur, Puri Sadar, Kanasa, Krushna Prasad, Pipili, Satyabadi, Gop blocks)

1. Refresher training of ASHAs, Khorda district:

Refresher training programme was organized for ASHAs of Khordha district from 22.10. 2019 to 12.12.2019. In total 329 ASHAs participated in this training programme in 10 batches. This was a residential training programme where ASHAs stayed at the VIJAYA training center for 4 days during the training programme. 20 DLTs imparted the training as per the set training module. For effective communication lecture method, play way, singing, acting methods were adopted. Giving a brief introduction about the four days training programme, the trainer(DLT) explained about the roles and responsibilities of ASHAs in present day context. She also explained in detail the grievances and redresal mechanism. In another session various health programmes were discussed in detail. The incentive provisions and various social security benefits were discussed threadbare amonth the trainer and participants. There was one session on reproductive health. On the second day of the programme focus was on newborn care. The ASHAs need to have a set of skill and adequate knowledge to address this issue. In another session, while discussing on child health, emphasis was given on immunization protocol. On Day 3, the participants recapped the past day's learning and continued discussion on nutrition. There was a session on PCPNDT Act and its implementation. Various aspects of Non Communicable Diseases were also discussed in another session. The last day's focus was on various National health programmes such as RNTCP, NVHCP, NVBDCP etc. With all these discussions, the training programmes came to an end. Similarly all the batches underwent training and went back with enhanced knowledge.

2. Induction training to the newly appointed ASHAs: 22nd to 29th January 2020

An induction training of a batch of newly appointed ASHAs was conducted in VIJAYA training center at Bhubaneswar. ASHAs of Baliana, Balipatna, Khordha, Chilika, Banpur, Bolagarh, Begunia and Bhubaneswar took part in this training programme. The ASHAs stayed in the residential facility of the training center and were actively participating in the training.

The goal of this training programme is to orient the newly appointed ASHAs to understand the needs of women and children in their respective operational areas and take action to reduce infant Mortality Rate and Maternal Mortality Rate in the rural areas in the State of Odisha and improving the health service facilities.

The programme was being conducted with the overall objectives to increase the level of awareness among ASHAs about their roles and responsibilities at the community level by 80% in

comparison to their existing knowledge. Their awareness needs to be increased on the Health System (Sub-Centre, PHC/CHC, DHH and Directorates of Health) and Support structure of ASHA programme. They are also expected to have clear knowledge on the health service available for people and various health programme. The training also emphasizes on increasing knowledge on staying healthy, maintain personal hygiene and keep up clean surroundings and sanitation. All issues relating to pregnant women, lactating mothers, infants, children and adolescents need to be understood by them, so that they can work towards the larger goal of the programme.

In total 43 numbers of ASHAs were trained who attended the training programme. One batch is to undergo 5 days of training. The training plan and schedule was prepared in consultation with the ZSS, Khorda and representatives from Vijaya. The State level resource persons were assigned to impart the training.



3. Round 1: Home Based Newborn Care Training for newly selected ASHAs: 31st January to 4th February 2020

This round of training was conducted in the VIJAYA Training center from 31st January to 2nd February 2020. 44 numbers of ASHAs were imparted training during this training programme. This batch of the trainees were mainly educated on the steps to be taken for the newborn

children. However care for the pregnant women, lactating mothers also came under the fold of this programme.

The goal of this training programme is to reduce infant mortality rate and maternal mortality rate in the rural areas in the State of Odisha and improving the health service facilities. The programme was laid out with the objectives to increase the level of awareness among ASHAs about their roles and responsibilities at the community level. They were imparted training so that there is increase in their awareness level on home based newborn care. It also aims to increase awareness of ASHAs on care of pregnant woman and new born child. The focus was on increasing knowledge on the use and administration of Nischay Kit.

The ASHA training emphasized to increase awareness of the ASHAs on care of eyes, umbilical cord, skin, thermal control and lever of new born babies. It also highlighted on the practical knowledge of ASHAs on the use of techniques of hand washing, weighing new born, wrapping, first examination of new born. During the training programme special focus was given to establish effective system of MIS and filling up of different forms. There was thrust to increase the practical knowledge and techniques on counseling to mother on breast feeding to new born.



4. Training on Non Communicable Diseases to ASHAs: 12th to 16th March 2020

The ASHAs of Bhubaneswar urban blocks of Khordha block were imparted training on the issues of non communicable diseases for the period from 12th to 16th March 2020. In total 38 number of ASHAs were given training.

On the 1st day of training programe the participants were told what are Non-communicable Diseases and why they are important. The participants actively participated to identify the non

communicable diseases they come across in their own communities. They were also told about importance of health promotion and how it can prevent and minimize occurrence of the non communicable diseases. There was also discussion on the risk factors for Non-communicable Diseases such as intake of tobacco and alcohol.

Risk Factors for NCDs was the major thrust of discussion on the second day of the training programme. How healthy diet and physical activity are key to keep NCDs at bay was discussed through participatory exercises. It was also pointed out that stress and overweight are the major risk factors accelerating the chances of occurrence of Non communicable diseases. There were role plays by the participants to show their understanding on health promotion and hypertension

On the third day the main course of discussion was around heart attack and strokes, diabetes, cervical cancer, oral cancer. It was also discussed that most of these diseases are caused due to the faulty lifestyle of people and this can be prevented.

4th day was more focused on issues relating to breast cancer. How to examine self, knowing your own body and the health care services available for breast cancer patients were the topics that were emphasized on. In the second half of the day there was session for the ASHAs to understand their key tasks. There was also orientation to the ASHAs for record format and consent. They were told about the disease-specific healthcare services available.

On the last day of the training there was orientation to CBAC. Work Flow Process for screening and referral of NCD cases were demonstrated and the ASHAs were oriented to maintain and follow it. Finally there were visits to the health facilities and feedback sharing of the participants.



Social Security and Empowerment Project of Persons with Disability, Government of Odisha

Vijaya in collaboration with Department of Social Security and EPWDs, Government of Odisha has initiated implementation of a programme to assess various development initiatives at the district and gram Panchayat level. The main goal of the project is to Achieve Social Integration

and economic freedom of the target population of various underprivileged categories such as people with disabilities, pensioners, transgender, alcoholics and drugs addicts, senior citizens, beggars, persons affected by leprosy. To achieve the said goal, various activities and tasks have been proposed to be carried out in various phases. Initially baseline surveys have been conducted in all the 10 blocks of Khorda district to understand the status of the social development schemes.



By conducting surveys of the pensioners information have been obtained regarding number of applications processed through nsap.nic.in portal for sanction, rejection or return, disbursement. There has been tracking of Aadhaar seeding for NSAP, Aadhaar verification for NSAP, Aadhaar seeding for MBPY, Aadhaar verification for MBPY. Discontinuation of dead or ineligible pensioners in NSAP MIS has been traced out. Information has been collected to know status of migration on account of change of age or other status. Information regarding number of applications processed through Nirman Shramik Pension Yojana(NSPY) for sanction, rejection or return, disbursement has been obtained through this survey.

Other information concerning the transgenders, alcoholics and drugs addicts, senior citizens, beggars, persons affected by leprosy have been obtained in detailed and have been submitted to the Department.
