Organisational Profile:

VIJAYA is a non-profit voluntary organisation registered under the Societies Registration Act, 1860 on 14th October 1996 bearing Registration No. 20154/1996-97-118. The Registered Office of the organisation is situated at 507, Sahid Nagar, Bhubaneswar, District Khurda, Odisha.

Over the years, VIJAYA has emerged as a committed grassroots development organisation dedicated to improving the quality of life of women, children, persons with disabilities, and socially disadvantaged communities. The organisation works towards creating an inclusive and equitable society through community participation, empowerment-based interventions, institutional collaboration, and sustainable development initiatives.

The organisation is also registered under the Foreign Contribution (Regulation) Act (FCRA) and has obtained registration under the Income Tax Act for exemption under Section 80G, enabling support from philanthropic institutions, development partners, and donors for its social welfare initiatives.

VIJAYA has consistently focused on addressing critical social concerns relating to women empowerment, child protection, education, rehabilitation, livelihood generation, disability inclusion, community health, psychosocial care, and institutional strengthening. Through its integrated development approach, the organisation has been able to reach vulnerable populations across rural, tribal, coastal, and urban communities of Odisha.

Governance and Management Structure :

VIJAYA is governed by a committed Executive Body headed by the President. The Executive Body meets periodically to review organisational policies, strategic priorities, programme implementation progress, governance mechanisms, and future action plans. The governing structure ensures transparency, accountability, participatory decision-making, and effective monitoring of all organisational activities.

The General Secretary and Treasurer play a pivotal role in overseeing the day-to-day administration, programme implementation, financial management, compliance mechanisms, and institutional coordination. The organisation is further supported by experienced programme personnel, administrative staff, consultants, and volunteers who contribute towards efficient execution of various development initiatives.

VIJAYA is also associated with a multidisciplinary panel of professionals including health consultants, management experts, development practitioners, sociologists, psychologists, educationists, legal advisors, and social workers who provide technical guidance and professional support in programme planning, implementation, monitoring, and evaluation.

Functional Locations and Programme Units :

VIJAYA operates through multiple programme units and project locations across Odisha to implement its welfare and development initiatives.

A. Nodal Office – Bhubaneswar

The Nodal Office situated at Bhubaneswar functions as the Headquarters and central administrative unit of VIJAYA. The office serves as the hub for programme planning, coordination, monitoring, training, documentation, financial management, stakeholder engagement, and institutional communication.

A part of the premises is also utilized as a Training and Resource Centre for conducting workshops, capacity-building programmes, staff training sessions, stakeholder consultations, and community-level orientation programmes.

B. Vijaya Binapani Helen Keller Special School for Visually and Hearing Impaired Girls, Langudi, Bhadrak

VJAYA has been successfully managing the *VijayaBinapani Helen Keller Special School for visually and Hearing Impaired Girls* at Langudi village in Bhadrak district under the *Deendayal Disabled Rehabilitation Scheme (DDRS)* of the Ministry of Social Justice and Empowerment, Government of India since 2005.

The institution is dedicated to providing inclusive and quality education, rehabilitation support, and holistic development opportunities to children with visual and hearing impairments, particularly those belonging to economically and socially disadvantaged families. The school focuses on academic learning, life skills, communication development, mobility support, co-curricular activities, and personality development to enable the students to become confident and self-reliant individuals.

During the reporting year, a total of 82 students were enrolled in the school from Class I to Class X, comprising 29 visually impaired students and 53 hearing impaired students.

The school continues to provide a supportive and child-friendly learning environment with special educational interventions tailored to the needs of children with disabilities. Special emphasis is placed on inclusive education practices, communication skills, assistive learning methods, co-curricular participation, health care, and emotional well-being of the students.

The Annual High School Certificate Examination for the Class X students is scheduled to commence from 20th February 2026. The school administration, teachers, and support staff are extending necessary academic guidance, remedial support, and preparatory assistance to ensure better performance of the students in the forthcoming examinations.

School Infrastructure :

The school is equipped with essential infrastructure and facilities required for creating a safe, inclusive, and conducive learning environment for the students. The institution continuously strives to maintain and improve its physical infrastructure to support academic, residential, cultural, and recreational activities of the children.

School Campus and Premises :

The school campus is clean, spacious, and child-friendly, providing a safe and pleasant environment for learning and overall development. The premises are maintained properly to ensure hygiene, security, and accessibility for all students.

Class Rooms :

The classrooms are adequately ventilated and furnished to facilitate effective teaching-learning processes. A peaceful and disciplined classroom environment is maintained to encourage participation and concentration among students.

Residential Set Up :

The residential facilities provide a caring and secure atmosphere for the children residing in the institution. Proper arrangements are made for accommodation, daily care, hygiene, and overall well-being of the inmates.

Playground :

The school has a playground where children participate in outdoor games and recreational activities. The facility promotes physical fitness, teamwork, and holistic development among the students.

Principal's Room :

The Principal's room serves as the administrative centre for academic planning, coordination, and interaction with staff, students, and visitors. It provides space for effective management and monitoring of school activities.

A separate prayer space is maintained for conducting prayer sessions, moral education activities, and group gatherings. Regular prayer sessions help inculcate discipline, values, and a sense of unity among the students.

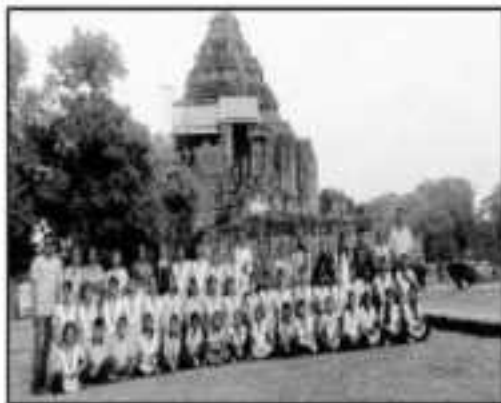

C. SHAKTI SADAN – PURI

SHAKTI SADAN is a Government of India supported women welfare and rehabilitation initiative functioning under the Department of Women and Child Development, Government of Odisha. The project is designed to provide care, protection, rehabilitation, and reintegration support to women and girls facing difficult and vulnerable circumstances.

The centre caters to survivors of domestic violence, trafficking, abuse, family atrocities, neglect, abandonment, sexual exploitation, and other forms of gender-based violence. It also extends support to runaway girls and women requiring immediate shelter, protection, and rehabilitation assistance.

The programme provides a comprehensive range of services including:

- Safe shelter and accommodation
- Nutritious food and clothing
- Health care and medical support
- Psychological counseling and emotional care
- Legal aid and guidance
- Vocational and skill development training
- Educational and rehabilitation support
- Reintegration and restoration services

Through these interventions, SHAKTI SADAN seeks to restore dignity, confidence, emotional well-being, and self-reliance among survivors, enabling them to rebuild their lives with security and hope.

The centre has been operational under VJAYA since April 2022 and has been supporting more than 50 women beneficiaries at a time, though the number of residents often varies depending upon emergency referrals and rehabilitation requirements.

The programme is managed by a dedicated team of professionals and support staff responsible for ensuring effective day-to-day functioning, safety, counseling, rehabilitation, and overall care of the residents. The management team comprises:

- Residential Superintendent
- DEO-cum-Office Assistant
- Multipurpose Staff
- Security Guard
- Cook
- Cook Helper

VIJAYA remains committed to strengthening the quality of care, psychosocial rehabilitation services, skill-building opportunities, and long-term reintegration support under SHAKTI SADAN through collaboration with government departments, civil society organisations, healthcare institutions, and community stakeholders.

Activities under SHAKTI SADAN

Rehabilitation Services :

SHAKTI SADAN serves as a safe shelter and rehabilitation centre for women and girls living in distressed and vulnerable circumstances. The centre provides temporary shelter, care, protection, and rehabilitation support to survivors of domestic violence, trafficking, abuse, neglect, abandonment, and other forms of social and emotional distress.

Women beneficiaries are referred to the Home through multiple channels including district administration, police authorities, Child Welfare Committees, social workers, volunteers, and community networks. In several cases, women approach the institution directly after becoming aware of the services available at SHAKTI SADAN.

Upon admission, every survivor is provided with essential support services including safe accommodation, nutritious food, clothing, healthcare, emotional support, and rehabilitation assistance. Special emphasis is placed on restoring confidence, dignity, and self-reliance among the residents.

As part of the rehabilitation process, beneficiaries are encouraged to participate in vocational and skill development training programmes aimed at enhancing their livelihood opportunities and economic independence. These interventions help the women reintegrate into society with improved confidence and sustainable means of livelihood after their discharge from the shelter home.

Counselling and Psychosocial Support :

Counselling and psychosocial care form an integral component of the rehabilitation process at SHAKTI SADAN. After admission, each resident undergoes an initial assessment conducted by trained counsellors to understand her emotional, psychological, and social condition.

Based on individual needs, personalized counselling and support services are provided to help survivors cope with trauma, fear, anxiety, stress, and emotional instability arising out of violence, abuse, neglect, or other adverse experiences. Regular individual and group counselling sessions are conducted to promote emotional healing, mental well-being, confidence building, and social adjustment.

Wherever necessary, medical consultation and specialized psychological support are arranged in coordination with healthcare institutions and professionals to ensure comprehensive care and recovery of the survivors. The overall counselling support system aims to create a safe, supportive, and empowering environment for the residents to rebuild their lives with dignity and hope.

Health Care and Well-being :

Health care and overall well-being remain key priority areas at SHAKTI SADAN. Many women admitted to the shelter arrive with pre-existing physical illnesses, psychological distress, trauma-related conditions, or other health complications arising from neglect, abuse, violence, or prolonged deprivation. Immediate attention and appropriate care are therefore provided to address their health and emotional needs.

Regular health check-ups are conducted by qualified medical practitioners to monitor the physical and mental health status of the residents. Individual health records are maintained for each inmate to ensure systematic monitoring of medical conditions, treatment history, nutritional status, and any chronic ailments requiring continued care and follow-up.

The residents are provided with necessary medicines and basic healthcare support free of cost. In cases requiring specialized treatment or emergency medical intervention, services are availed from nearby Government hospitals and healthcare institutions in coordination with the local administration and health departments.

In addition to curative care, emphasis is also placed on preventive and promotive health practices. Regular activities such as yoga, meditation, physical exercise, recreational

activities, and devotional sessions are organized to promote mental peace, emotional stability, physical fitness, and holistic well-being among the residents.

Special care is taken to ensure personal hygiene, sanitation, cleanliness, nutritional support, and a healthy living environment within the shelter premises. Through these interventions, SHAKTI SADAN strives to create a safe, healthy, and supportive atmosphere conducive to healing, recovery, and rehabilitation.

Vocational Training and Livelihood Promotion :

Vocational training and livelihood promotion constitute an important component of the rehabilitation process at SHAKTI SADAN. As the shelter primarily functions as a short-stay rehabilitation home, special emphasis is placed on enhancing the self-reliance, confidence, and economic independence of the residents to support their reintegration into society.

The inmates are provided with opportunities to participate in various skill development and income-generating activities based on their interests and capabilities. Training programmes conducted at the shelter include tailoring, preparation of cotton wicks, and production of paper packaging bags, among other livelihood-oriented activities.

These vocational interventions aim to equip the women with practical skills that can support sustainable livelihood opportunities even after their discharge from the shelter home.

The products prepared by the residents are also marketed and sold in local markets and community platforms, thereby providing them with exposure to entrepreneurial practices and income-generation processes.

The proceeds generated from the sale of these products are shared with the trainees based on their level of participation and contribution, which further motivates the residents and encourages financial responsibility, dignity of labour, and self-confidence.

Through such livelihood promotion initiatives, SHAKTI SADAN seeks to empower women economically and facilitate their transition towards a life of dignity, self-dependence, and social inclusion.



Vocational Training

International Women's Day Observation and other celebrations :

On the occasion of International Women's Day, SHAKTI SADAN organized an awareness and community outreach programme with active participation of the staff members and residents of the shelter home. The programme aimed at promoting awareness on women's rights, gender equality, dignity, and social empowerment.

As part of the observance, a public awareness rally was conducted in the surrounding community areas. The participants carried placards displaying messages on women empowerment, protection of women's rights, gender justice, and social inclusion. Information, Education, and Communication (IEC) materials relating to women's rights, legal entitlements, safety measures, and welfare schemes were also distributed among community members to enhance public awareness and sensitization.

The programme served as an important platform to encourage community participation, promote gender sensitivity, and reinforce the collective commitment towards creating a safe, equitable, and respectful environment for women and girls.

An awareness campaign named, 16Days of Activism against Gender-Based Violence was organised by UNITE Activism. The objective of this campaign is to end violence against Women & Girls.

Such activities help create a peaceful and supportive environment within the shelter and contribute towards reducing stress, anxiety, and emotional isolation among the residents.

The residents are also provided opportunities for healthy recreation through television viewing, particularly programmes related to spirituality, health, yoga, motivational content, and social awareness. In addition, inmates are allowed and facilitated to maintain contact with their family members and relatives whenever appropriate and feasible.

A.SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES:

a) Nature of Activities:

VIJAYA is a non-profit organization registered under the Societies Registration Act, 1860 and the Income Tax Act, 1961. When there is a possible obligation in respect of which the likelihood of outflow of resources is remote, no provision or disclosure is made.
